FROM THE VICARAGE

Do you know this story from Victorian times: The scene is a bedroom in a tiny farm cottage. An old man lies in the bed dying. Beside the bed his wife, the doctor and the vicar ready to administer the last rites. The vicar leans over the bed and after a moment says 'I'm afraid he's gone'. The doctor leans over to confirm and says 'Yes I agree'. Suddenly the old man sits bolt upright - 'NO I B'AIN'T !' The wife says to him: 'Lie down George - doctor and parson know best.'

We can almost imagine the story to be true back then, but today the idea of authority has radically changed. So have we lost something precious here, or are we well rid of it? Is the world a better place with obedience consigned to the rubbish bin? - except perhaps in the armed forces, and even that is changing.

In recent years all authorities have been exposed to scrutiny and all are now seen as being just as fallible as the rest of us. Whether we think of the Royal Family, or the police, politicians, teachers, doctors, clergy - we can no longer hide our mistakes and corruptions as we used to. Even experts in various fields of study are no longer trusted implicitly.

Presumably we have to welcome this new openness - like so many things it's not great, but it's better than the alternative. But having freedom from oppression and universal human rights leads inevitably to a way of thinking which is called 'post-modernism' - meaning that everyone has the right to make up their own mind about every aspect of their life. No-one has the right to tell me how to behave, or what I can and cannot believe, and like it or not, we are going to have to live with this.

But a nagging question remains: Is there really no authority to whom I should hold allegiance? We might think of the laws of our country, or indeed the laws of nature in this way - if we disregard the delicate balance of the natural world, it will end up disregarding us and will inevitably jump up and bite us, and that will be painful - if not fatal. But at a deeper level, is there any ultimate authority over life itself that we should obey?

Well, look around. Look long and hard. Do you find anywhere a more genuine and authoritative voice than that of Jesus Christ? Where can you find such a profound depth of holiness combined with loving practical action; or wisdom of teaching alongside total self-sacrifice? Study the lives of whoever you wish, and ask whether, in comparison, the life and teaching of Jesus does not stand head and shoulders above the rest? And the reason I try to obey his voice is that whenever there is a conflict of interest between what I think and what he teaches, I know deep down that he is always right.

So here's the question If the world is not going to be saved by the teaching and example of Jesus, who IS going to save it?

BENEFICE NEWS

Good News: Our Churches Are Now Open For Private Prayer.

We are delighted that Government regulations now permit us to open our church buildings for services and individual prayer and hope that anyone wishing to do so will feel safe to enter.

All churches in the Benefice are open every day and opening patterns are the same as they were previously in each parish.

The term individual is defined as follows: "A person or household entering the venue to pray on their own and not part of a group led prayer or communal act." (Robert Jenrick announcement)

If you do wish to use the church for private prayer, please be mindful of the importance of following government advice in respect of hand washing and social distancing.

Notices have been put up on church noticeboards, on the church doors and at the entry and exit points for each church, to provide specific guidance about the safety and hygiene arrangements in each church, as details may differ slightly due to the differences in the church buildings. For example: in some churches pews may be roped off to limit the amount of routine cleaning required and in some churches there is access to running water. Please read these notices carefully before entering the church.

- Hand sanitiser has been placed in the porch area of each church and also inside the church near the door.
- Please use this before entering and when exiting the church. NB. it is still wise to wash and dry your hands thoroughly with soap and water as soon as you get home, as an extra precaution.
- Please observe the social distancing rules and maintain a distance of 2 metres between yourself and others not in your household whilst in the church. Individual churches may have additional guidance about this so please observe any specific measures which have been put in place in individual churches.
- If the church appears too crowded to facilitate social distancing, please wait outside until it is safe to enter.

Please do not enter the church if you or anyone in your household has symptoms of Covid 19 or if you have been advised to self - isolate because you have been in contact with someone who has tested positive.

Cleaning schedules have been revised to ensure door handles, light switches and other areas likely to have been touched by others are cleaned daily

when the church is opened but please be mindful of the fact that surfaces might have been contaminated later in the day and avoid touching surfaces unnecessarily.

England's Tree Of The Year 2020

Voting is officially open for England's Tree of the Year 2020.

The Wilmington Yew



This ancient yew grows in the churchyard of St Mary and St Peter's Church, Wilmington. However, at an estimated 1600 years old, the yew predates the founding of the church by several hundred years. Yew trees were spiritually important in pre-Christian Britain, and churches were often built on pagan spiritual sites, so it's entirely possible that this tree was important to the locals of the time in the hundreds of years before the church was built.

Today, the tree's heavy boughs are supported by a number of wooden props, reducing the strain their weight causes the tree and therefore reducing the chances that one might break. A hefty chain wrapped around the two trunks serves a similar

purpose, holding this venerable ancient together.

The professional propping of the tree was well and successfully carried out by R.W. Green after many very generous donations were made towards the cost of maintaining the tree in a very safe condition for decades to come. THANK YOU and please pass this news on to all you know.

Safe Space For Victims Relunched In 'Lockdown'

'Safe Space Sussex' ('SS') is an online directory of local victim services, created by Police & Crime Commissioner Katy Bourne. In response to the 'lockdown' and concerns raised around crimes like Domestic Abuse, this site has been upgraded and advice has been shared on social media (@SussexPCC) to help victims covertly reach out for help whilst stuck in isolation – search #SafeSpaceSussex.

With the entire country in lockdown, many services have expressed their concerns about victims of crime not feeling able to safely reach out for help. They have seen a decrease in engagement from victims with reports of crimes (like domestic abuse) made to Sussex Police, reducing by around 4%.

It's vital that residents are aware of the support that is still available if they need it. Safe Space Sussex has been equipped with a new search tool so that within 10 seconds, victims of any crime can find the service they need. It also has a 'leave site now' button that users can press to quickly exit the site.

Tailored guidance has been shared across social media community groups on how victims can access the new website covertly, using incognito tabs, as they may be living with their perpetrators during 'lockdown' and their search history may be monitored as a result.

Victims can also covertly let Sussex Police know they are in danger. The '55' technology is in place for those too scared to speak, to alert a call handler to the fact they need help by pressing 55 on their mobile phone once they've dialled 999.

There is still help and support available for all victims of crime during the Covid crisis.

If you find yourself in an emergency where you think you or others may be in immediate danger dial 999. Sussex Police are always there for you when you need them. Don't suffer in silence.

The approved minutes are posted on the notice boards shortly after the meeting in which they are approved.

NOTES ON THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Held via Zoom on Monday 13 July 2020 at 7.30pm

Those present were: Councillors Tyler Butterworth (Vice Chair), Claire Church, Jeremy Christey, Alison Cotton (Tree Warden), County Councillor Stephen Shing. Claire Reynolds (Clerk). Apologies had been received from Councillors Pam Merritt,

Lizzie Chisholm, Helen Baulcombe, Michael Bridges and District Councillor Michael Lunn. Councillor Butterworth chaired the meeting and welcomed everyone. There was no Declaration of Interest and no Public Discussion.

The Minutes of the Meeting dated 11 May 2020 were approved and signed as a true record.

Matters arising from the Minutes of the meeting held on 13 January 2010.

- The Clerk had asked District Councillor Lunn for the number of planning applications already approved, in light of the rejection of the Wealden District Council Local Plan - **No response had been received to date.**
- The Clerk had obtained the SDNPA Dark Skies Officer details and will circulate round to Councillors.

No Report had been received from the District Councillor – Cllr Michael Lunn

Reports of the Parish Councillors

- **Folkington** - Councillor Chisholm had emailed the Clerk with the following report:
 - The hedge on the A27 east towards Polegate needs cutting back as the vision is extremely bad. Clerk to report this to the relevant authority.
 - The amount of motorbikes and 4x4's has increased around Folkington as well as the litter. Signage will be put up to try and deter the vehicles and encourage visitors to take their rubbish home with them.
 - The new Parish Council noticeboard is being currently being constructed.
- **Milton Street** - Nothing to report.
- **Wilmington:**
 - The footpath from the car park down to the Long Man is rather overgrown. Clerk to report this to the relevant authority.
- Councillor Church reported that Wilmington Green area had been cut for hay as agreed by Wealden District Council. It will be topped next week.
- Adders nest – this is located at the foot of the large hawthorn bush as you go through the gate to go up to the Long Man.

Report of the Tree Warden - Alison Cotton reported the following:

Ash Die Back disease is going to be serious over years to come with up to 95% of Ash tree being lost. If anyone has any concerns over the Ash trees within the Parish Alison is happy to help and advice. Report of the County Councillor – Councillor Stephen Shing

- **Waste Collection Sites:** The Eastbourne and Hailsham sites are now open.
- **Schools:** these are slowly re-opening.
- **Social distancing:** this is still in place.
- **Second wave:** the concern is that there might be a second wave of infection however, the rate of spread in this area is low in comparison to other areas.
- Councillor Shing is always happy to be contacted to deal with any queries.

Corona Virus:

- **Parish Council procedures update from NALC / SALC** - The Clerk had been circulating updates to Councillors regarding Parish Council procedures from NALC and SALC during this time. The transition period is starting now and through August. The Community Hubs are still supporting those that require assistance.
- **Parish Council assistance update** - A short report had been received from Nigel Bentley who has been co-ordinating volunteers and this will be circulated round to Councillors. 3VA, who have been co-ordinating the Community Hub within Wealden, had sent through a request asking how communities will continue to offer support around the pandemic. The responses to this will then be used to update the map that the Community Hub use to identify potential sources of support and ensure they are able to address any gaps in provision. Thanks were expressed to all those who had been supporting members of the community throughout this time.

Replacement of noticeboard for Folkington - This is being currently under construction.

Alfriston Traffic Management Committee - Nothing further to report on this at this time

A27 news - Work had started on the junction improvements along the A27. MP Maria Caulfield has nothing further to report on this at this stage regarding the A27 major road scheme.

Councillors email addresses – update - Only two Councillors still need to be set up. The Clerk is happy to assist them with this if necessary.

- **Cuckmere Haven SOS Planning Application** - Details of this had been circulated to Councillors prior to the meeting. The Planning Application is to obtain planning permission to restore and renew the failing sea defences at Cuckmere Haven West beach. Councillor Merritt had suggested that the Parish Council support this application and it was agreed by those Councillors present. **The Clerk to write a letter of support to the SDNPA as instructed.**
- **SDNPA and UK Power Networks project to remove overhead lines from the National Park.** Details of this project had been received and had been circulated to Councillors prior to this meeting. It is proposed that Highways England, SDNPA and UK Power Networks work together to achieve this as part of the A27 improvements currently taking place. Councillor Merritt had suggested that the Parish Council supports this scheme. **The Clerk to write a letter of support to SDNPA as instructed.**
- **Kent, Surrey and Sussex Air Ambulance** - A letter of thanks had been received for the donation sent from Long Man Parish Council.

Lockdown Birdlife ~ a Rarity in the Cuckmere Valley

Despite all the hardships suffered, the impacts on families, friends and of course The Economy, we have also been extremely privileged in an unexpected way through the process of the 2020 Lockdown. Our environment has taken the chance to breathe, maybe for the first time in many decades. We have enjoyed wonderful clear blue skies; cleaner air to breathe; and the relative silence without noise of vehicles on the roads or aircraft overhead. In particular that has meant that one could hear the birds singing.

We have been particularly fortunate this year in that we have had nesting in our own garden a pair of Spotted Flycatchers (Scientific name : *Muscicapa striata*). That is a species that has become vanishingly rare in the overall region of Sussex, and nationally it is a Red Listed species in respect of conservation status (source : RSPB). Survey Numbers have shown a drop of over 80% since the British Trust for Ornithology survey of 1968.

I had not seen any Flycatcher for probably the best part of 15 to 20 years. I used to see them frequently up in Surrey, but since moving to Sussex over 13 years ago I have certainly not seen a 'Spotted Fly' in that time.

From May 31st to close to the end of July we have been able to watch almost daily a pair that nested in our garden in the Cuckmere Valley. They successfully raised (we think) at least 2 fledglings. We have a photo of one of

the fledglings and several photos of the parent birds when they were hunting within the garden.

This has been reported with the County Bird Recorder and therefore may appear in the Sussex Bird Report for 2020 in due course.

Recent years have low, confirmed, breeding records for the whole of Sussex ~ both West & East.

Confirmed Breeding of Spotted Flycatcher is a rare thing in Sussex. Statistics drawn from published Bird Reports ~ with records given by numbers of tetrads, reveal the following :

2018 9 (plus probable 7);
 2017 6 (plus probable 4);
 2016 9 (plus probable 6); &
 2015 13 (plus probable 5).

DRUSILLAS PARK RAISES OVER £1.5K FOR SLOTH CONSERVATION

Welcome to Drusillas zoo news! Sue Woodgate, Drusillas Zoo Business Manager, gives us the inside scoop on the zoo! From new babies to funny animal stories and more, Sue takes us behind the scenes and giving us an exclusive glimpse into life at Drusillas.

We have been appealing for help from the public for help to raise money for our Conservation Charity of the Year, The Sloth Conservation Foundation (SloCo). Following a mass outpouring of public support, we managed to raise an amazing £1735 for sloth conservation in just 8 days.

After coronavirus closures and restrictions forced us to cancel our fundraising activities for the year, we called out for help from the public and hundreds of sloth lovers came to our assistance!



The Sloth Conservation Foundation is a non-profit UK registered charity based in Costa Rica, that aims to protect sloths in the wild through conservation initiatives and scientific research.

We were so disappointed to not be able to go ahead with our planned fundraising activities, but we were determined that we would raise funds for SloCo in any way we could. We are so overwhelmed by the generosity of the public, without hesitation they answered our call and helped us to raise an incredible amount of money.

We launched a giveaway to win a sloth bundle and asked if anyone would like to donate, but we were very clear that they didn't have to donate to win. We are just completely gobsmacked at the kindness everyone has shown and even though they didn't have to, they all donated and helped us to reach this incredible amount of money. This goes a massive way towards helping protect sloths in the wild.

Conservation is really important to us and something we have always strived to make a core part of Drusillas. Over the years we have raised over £100,000 for conservation. Sloths are facing the most devastating reality in the wild, so we really want to do what we can to raise funds and support for SloCo.

This is just an incredible amount of money and they difference it will make to SloCo is huge. This money will go towards building rope bridges across highways so sloths can travel freely over roads without the risk of getting hit by a car. The rope bridges will also help all manner of tree dwelling wildlife in Costa Rica. It is heart-breaking to see so many of our beautiful animals losing their homes and natural habitats due to deforestation.

SloCo is working hard with local communities to provide education on conservation, to stop the illegal pet and selfie trade, to preserve habitats and to save the world's slowest mammal from extinction. We are truly grateful to everyone who has helped us raise these funds.



We have been working hand-in-hand with SloCo over the past few months to help them achieve their conservation goals. The foundation was created by Dr Rebecca Cliffe, one of the world's leading experts in sloths.
