FROM THE PARSONAGE

Many years ago, I visited Bethlehem and the Church of The Nativity. I went below ground level into the confines of a richly decorated cave and was shown a silver star on the floor and told it was the spot where Jesus was born. Very few Christians remain in Bethlehem. Though it is in the West Bank and under Palestinian governance you cannot get into the city without going through an Israeli checkpoint. The church was under siege by the Israeli Defence Force when some Palestinian militants took refuge there in 2002.

If one thinks back to the time of Christ one wonders what the atmosphere was like then, living under Roman occupation. An occupying force lives with the insecurity of uprising and will often use fear to control and suppress. The occupation generates its antagonists simply by virtue of its own existence. In His time many thought Jesus might be a leader who would liberate the people from their occupation, that was what many thought the Messiah would do. Amongst his followers Jesus chose Simon. He was referred to as a 'zealot'. Little is known about him but the name suggests an angry, possibly extreme individual, passionate about freedom and justice for his people.

Jesus had other ideas and a different focus. Just as I went beneath ground to see his place of birth so He taught people to go below the surface to the root of problems. He replaced the commandment of 'an eye for eye' with 'offer the other cheek' too for the attacker to hit. Was this Jesus' lesson in pacifism? He guided people to go into their own heart and to find their own forgiveness and healing first before doing anything else.

Whilst researching at a Commonwealth War Grave I learnt about a movement in the Second World War called 'The Silent Minute'. It was the idea of W. Tudor-Pole in 1940 and had the approval of the government. The BBC took it on board and the broadcast of Big Ben on November 10th, 1940, marked the first time this silent minute was kept. The movement was revived in America after the 9/11 attack on the World Trade Centre by Dorothy Forster. A shepherd sitting on a hill, fishermen sitting by water, a Palestinian in a wheelchair cutting handheld crosses from a plank of olive wood, monks and nuns in their convents and monasteries at prayer. Does stillness and silence make any difference?

Our churches are places where one can usually keep a minute of silence with intention and focus on peace. As we enter a church we hope to enter more deeply into ourselves. At Christmas they become places where people can go to connect, through prayer and imagination, with that place where Jesus was born, into that presence and that peace which came into our world in its brokenness and fear with power and a message of love and forgiveness

Wishing everyone Joy and Peace this Christmas.



How sad and bad and mad it was - but then, how sweet it was.

Did you know that during Victorian times there was one pub for every hundred people living in the country. Some might call this the good ole days, others an alcoholic calamity. However, if the same ratio of population to pubs existed today, Wilmington would have at least four grogshops - good for choice, bad for business!

Historically, pubs were seen as wilfully eccentric places. For instance, *The King Charles*

1st pub in London hosted 'Nude Alpine Climbing Evenings'. This involved alcohol-fuelled participants climbing around the pub without touching the ground and without their clothes on. Yes, in the buff! Whilst I'm tempted to introduce these energetic evenings at the Long Man, I'm not convinced we could get them off the ground - boom boom!

The George in London was renamed The George & Vulture because the publican had a pet vulture which he kept chained to a perch outside the front door while 'Bag O'Nails', a very popular pub name of the day, was corrupted from the French word 'Baccanales', meaning French religious festivals. God, get me a drink!

Talking of tipples, 'Mother-in-law' was slang for a stout & bitter mix, 'Pony' a smaller than half-pint measure, 'Dog's Nose' was beer with a drop of gin added and, if you were really hard-up, you could buy a meths & cheap red wine mix - appropriately named 'Lunatic's Broth'!

The Gin Palaces of the 18th century - popular when the Industrial Revolution was in full swing - were opulent and alluring drinking establishments adorned with gaslight, glitter and gilding, catering for the common man. The rise in these establishments coincided with the government of the day slashing taxes on spirits and as a result, spirit production in the country doubled.

Charles Dickens famously described Gin Palaces as being perfectly dazzling when contrasted with the darkness and dirt of everyday life.

FAMILY SUPPORT WORK (FSW) NOVEMBER 2023 UPDATE

Dear Friends,

We are in one of our busiest times of the year at the moment, as we juggle the many needs of our families as well as all the preparations for Advent and Christmas. Parties are planned, hamper packing dates are scheduled and we are getting daily calls from churches and other organisations asking what gifts would be most appropriate this year. Thank you to everybody who is supporting us this year with food, presents, financial donations or by volunteering – we are incredibly grateful.

Away from the festive planning, things remain very difficult for our families with the increased energy costs over the winter months contributing to financial problems. We are very grateful to anybody who is supporting our 'Share the Warmth' winter fuel campaign, which makes a huge difference to these families who are struggling. There are still very long waiting lists for specialist services such as SEN support for children or access to mental health professionals, so our practitioners are really vital sources of support to families in these circumstances.

Funding continues to be challenging, with so many charities seeking support from grant funders and individual donors alike. We really do value all the support we receive from churches and their congregations as well as local groups including Rotary and Lions clubs. 

Drusillas Zoo in Sussex is giving away the most unforgettable opportunity to one lucky visitor - a close encounter experience with their baby capybara triplets, to raise money for Amaze – a charity that supports disabled young people and their families in Sussex.

The tremendously cute trio: Marmalade, Tango, and Squash, were born to adoring Mum, Clementine and doting Dad, Augustus, on 28th September this year. A public vote was held on socials to help name the cheeky gang, who keepers and visitors have fallen head over hooves for! Drusillas have been inundated with

visitor photos of the gorgeous capybara pups, often spotted playing in the feeding troughs in their habitat, and mischievously munching on their favourite browse branches.

Knowing how popular capybaras have become in recent years (weekend encounters with this sweet species are fully booked until April 2024!), and how rare the opportunity to have a close-up experience with baby capys is, Drusillas hopes that the excitement around the new arrivals will help to fundraise for their Charity of the Year, Amaze.

Capy fans who would like to be in with a chance of being up close to the terrific triplets are invited to enter the fundraiser prize draw, open until 9am on 15th December. Entrants can take part as many times as they like, with 100% of monies raised pledged to Amaze Sussex.

Drusillas hopes to raise enough money to help support Amaze's many projects which support SEND families - for example - £1000 pays for 25 families to take part in a fun day, enabling disabled children, their siblings and parents to connect with other families in a safe and inclusive space.

Amaze is a Sussex based charity that provides information, advice and support to families of children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND). It was set up in 1997 by a group of parent carers to support other parent carers through the challenges of bringing up a disabled child. 25 years later and they are proud to continue to be user-led throughout.



Children and young people with SEND are more likely to live in poverty, have mental health problems, live in single parent households and not be in education, employment or training as they move into adulthood. To help combat this, Amaze provide a range of services aimed at improving the emotional, physical, social and financial wellbeing of parent carers and young people with SEND aged 14-25:

Information and advice via their advice line and website
Workshops and courses on education, health and social care issues
Peer support groups for young people
Education, employment and training support for young people
Befriending support groups for parent carers
Help with claiming disability benefits
NDP Family Training and Navigation Service for families of children with
neurodevelopmental conditions (eq. autism and ADHD).

With the arrival of the new babes, Drusillas now has six Capybaras, including the triplet's big brother Satsuma. Capybara fans can win the chance to be some of the first people to meet the whole 'cappy' family up close! An amazing one-to-one experience lasting between 30 and 40 minutes which will leave you grinning from ear to ear.
