FROM THE PARSONAGE

A NEW WINDOW FOR SELMESTON CHURCH

Leonie Seliger runs the stained glass studio at Canterbury Cathedral where her team works on the conservation of the medieval windows. She is also an artist and designer and was selected from three artists who were invited to submit designs for a new window in Selmeston in memory of June Mockett. She died in 2018 and is buried, alongside her husband and daughter, in the churchyard. The window is being commissioned by two close friends. The window celebrates the Cuckmere Pilgrim Path and the collection of images on the left show some of the inspiration behind her design. The brief asked for a window which was abstract and a contrast to the other windows in the church, that it would still allow light to enter and that it

would draw a contemplative gaze from the viewer. It's a window for worshippers and those walking the path, an offering for all to enjoy. Stephanie Lewis-Grey has been overseeing the project and it will be completed by the time you read this but only revealed at a special service of dedication by Bishop Will at 3 p.m. on 10th July to which everyone is warmly invited. Within the design are three outline figures of Christ to discover based on Crucifixions by Michelangelo – a reference to the Trinity. Leonie has faced and overcome many challenges in the sourcing of her materials and the making of the window and is excited now at the prospect of seeing it in situ. It is a unique design and one which will make people pause, reflect and bathe momentarily in its colours as they make their journey along the Cuckmere Pilgrim Path. From 10th July please do come and see it.

'Benefice Administrator' for the Churches of Alciston, Arlington, Berwick, Selmeston and Wilmington

We are seeking to appoint a Benefice Administrator to support ministry across the five churches of Alciston, Arlington, Berwick, Selmeston and Wilmington and assist in the outreach work at Berwick. In this role you will support the Incumbent Revd Peter Blee, based in Berwick, the Assistant Priest, Revd Shirley Pearce based in Wilmington, the churchwardens, the Safeguarding Officer and PCCs in each parish. The successful applicant will work mainly from home, with occasional sessions at the Parsonage in Berwick.

The workload may vary considerably from week to week and the applicant needs to fully appreciate the need for flexibility. One factor determining hours is the church calendar, e.g. around Easter and Advent and the Annual Parochial Meeting (April/May) workloads are generally heavier. The initial average is anticipated to be 15-20 hours per month.

WILMINGTON, FOLKINGTON AND MILTON STREET VILLAGE CLUB

The Wilmington Village Club committee met on the 10th of May. We finalised the arrangements for the Jubilee lunch on the 5th of June (see separate article) and confirmed that we had received a small National Lottery grant towards the food, something commemorative and for renovating the boules pitch. We agreed to hold defibrillator training for our renovated defibrillator and looked at other possible events for the summer around the monthly pub-in-the-club events. We're still looking for more volunteers to 'manage' a pub-in-the-club evening (setting up, serving drinks, clearing up – all best done by a team so that the burden doesn't fall just on a couple of people. The village hall has a defibrillator situated outside the front door, if you need to use it in an emergency when you call 999 you will be told the combination as it is registered.


The village club have given a donation to the Eastbourne Community First Responders as they are a charity and gave 2 hours of their time to pass on their knowledge.

A Good Read

Do You Like Dickens? (With apologies to Francoise Sagan)

I like Dickens enormously. Although I see little purpose in ranking writers, I have to say that he is my favourite English novelist. His warmth, passion, humanity and humour have impressed me for a long time. It probably all began with "A Christmas

Carol" when I was young and which I now read every year. Then to the Classics Illustrated version of "David Copperfield" – (do you remember that series? A major novel turned into a comic strip? It was much frowned on by the teachers at my school). When I read the real novel, I realised how good it was. "Hard Times" was an A Level English text and that introduced me to the major later novels. It's a very rich field. I understand that some readers may find his prose sometimes too florid, a touch sentimental even and may regard his characterisation more like caricature but I usually find him convincing.



In the 19th century it was very common for a novel to appear in weekly or monthly parts. The book could stand alone or, as with Curiosity Shop, be part of a magazine. Dickens used this format with his early novels and in the case of Curiosity Shop it was issued in episodes in a magazine, all of which he wrote, called "Master Humphreys' Clock." The serial was enormously popular both in England and in the United States. There is a story, probably apocryphal, that the ship carrying the final chapters of the novel was besieged in New York Harbour by New Yorkers anxious to know the fate of the heroine, Little Nell.

The novel is what is often called picaresque – a journey by the main characters and their chance meetings along the way. It was a very popular form in the18th century. In this case Little Nell – a girl of indeterminate age and her grandfather - flee the Old Curiosity shop to escape the predations of the objectionable Mr Quilp and his cronies. Scholars have traced the journey north wards to Banbury, Birmingham, and ultimately to Shropshire. The contrast between the delight of rural England and the horrors of industrial Birmingham are brilliantly done and it's typical of Dicken's humanity that even in the darkest and most poverty-stricken places Nell and Grandad are given help and support. We might diagnose Grandad as suffering from dementia and certainly his



thought is clouded. The rigours of the journey through cold, rain and snow eventually lead to Nell's physical decline. Although she and Grandad appear to have disappeared a mysterious stranger encourages those who care for Nell to find her. They arrive just too late to find that Nell is dead although the grandfather survives. You may be thinking that all this is a little unlikely – and I'm sorry to say that you may well be right.

I can't deny that some of the writing is wonderful, and the character of the main villain Mr Quilp is powerfully drawn

although the emphasis on his dwarf like build might seem inappropriate now. There are some entertaining characters such as Quilp's young servant who irritates his master by standing on his hands but overall, the plot is very creaky and many of the breaks in the serialisation are heavily signalled. Some changes in the characters are at best hard to accept. For example, Dick Swiveller who begins as an evil hanger-on to Mr Quilp changes completely to become a defender not only of Little Nell but also of a timid maid who is being treated like a slave by the accomplices of Mr Quilp.(Whether the name suggested the change or the change suggested the name is uncertain.) The heavy sentiment in the final chapters fully deserved gales of laughter from Oscar Wilde and is hard to take seriously.

Do I like the novel? – it pains me to say no. Would I recommend you should read it? Only if you have read most of his other novels first. Regard it as an unfortunate error by an otherwise great writer. But if you haven't read any Dickens or perhaps only read him at school do ignore the fate of Little Nell and read his other novels. You might

start with" David Copperfield" which is in part biographical. A recent film version turned the book into a comic romp and lost some of the serious themes of the novel. I would also recommend "Great Expectations" with its memorable opening on the Essex marshes and "A Tale of Two Cities", a historical novel about the French Revolution. But my favourites are the two late novels" Bleak House" and "Dombey and Son" and I hope you might try one of that wonderful pair.

The Unadopted Minutes are circulated to the Parish Councillors and subsequently considered at the next Parish Council Meeting and if agreed, are signed as a true record. The Minutes can only be publicised after they have been approved, therefore in order for there to be no undue delay in keeping the residents of the parish informed about the meetings, the notes are printed in the Parish Magazine. The approved minutes are posted on the notice boards shortly after the meeting in which they are approved.

NOTES ON THE ANNUAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PARISH- ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING-LMPC MEETING Held at Wilmington Village Hall on Monday 9 May 2022

Those present were: Councillors Pam Merritt (Chairman), Tyler Butterworth (Vice Chairman), Jeremy Christey, Claire Church, Lizzie Chisholm, Helen Baulcombe, Alison Cotton (Tree Warden), County Councillor Stephen Shing, Ruth Zacharewicz – Wilmington Village Club, Claire Reynolds (Clerk). Apologies for absence had been received from Councillors Michael Bridges and Jeremy Christey. There was no Declaration of Interest.

ANNUAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PARISH-7.00PM

The Minutes of the Annual Assembly of the Parish dated 13 May 2019: Councillor Merritt explained that due to Covid an Annual Assembly had not been held in 2020 or 2021 therefore the last Minutes were for the last Annual Assembly held in May 2019. After considering the Unadopted Minutes (which had previously been circulated) it was agreed that these be signed as a true record. There were no Matters Arising.

Annual Report of the Chair - Councillor Pam Merritt: Due to coronavirus, our last Assembly of the Parish was in 2019. I am pleased to say that despite not being

able to meet in person until July 2021, Councillors adapted to the situation by holding meetings on Zoom, thus enabling the business of the Parish Council to continue. I would like to thank the Clerk for facilitating this and assisting those of us who needed extra tuition!

Since July 2021, our regular 2 monthly meetings have continued in person. The noticeboard in Folkington has been replaced and re-sited in the church porch, ESCC Rights of Way Team have replaced the gate onto the Long Man which was used by an exceptional number of visitors during lockdown and various tree work has been organised. The Parish Council has commented on 21 planning applications made to SDNP and WDC in the past year.

Since 2020, residents have had to deal with a lot of delays and diversions at various times due to National Highways' work on the junctions at Polegate and Wilmington and the enlargement of Drusillas roundabout. A group of Wilmington residents are still in consultation with National Highways to try and make the Wilmington junction safer.

Last summer the Parish Council applied to WDC to make the Giants Rest pub an Asset of Community Value; this was to try and prevent it from being sold for residential development which would have been a great loss for the village. I am pleased to say that we were successful in our application and even more pleased to say that a local businessman has purchased the pub and is in the process of renovating and refurbishing it. We all look forward to its reopening next year!

Finally, I would like to thank the Clerk for all her hard work during the year, thank my fellow Councillors for all they have done on behalf of the Parish and thank our Tree Warden for looking after and increasing the number of trees in the Parish.

Annual Report of the District Councillor -There was no report received.

Annual Report of the County Councillor – Cllr Stephen Shing: I would like to thank the Parish Council for inviting me to provide a County Report for the 2022 Annual Parish Council meeting. In addition, I would like to thank the residents for contacting me with their concerns and to our fellow Parish Council colleagues for a good working relationship.

COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTION MAY 2021 - I was re-elected for Willingdon and South Downs division, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those residents for their support. In addition, to thank all those residents in my division for their support in the last four years.

Since the pandemic in 2020 with the lockdown restrictions, I was in the group which needed to stay at home. Fortunately, Daniel and Raymond are key workers and could continue working from home. Our work as councillors was initially difficult with the restrictions to assist our residents in comparison to pre-pandemic. I continued to resolve residents' concerns and my usual work on local schools, tackling road surfacing, footways and potholes repairs, traffic in Alfriston, Exceat

Bridge, the first phase of the Hailsham – Polegate – Eastbourne movement and access corridor, Dittons Road Roundabout, A2270/ A22 Eastbourne Road have been approved in March 2022. East Sussex County Council approved LOCAL GROWTH FUND FUNDED PACKAGES in March 2022.

A number of the schemes in the capital programme are to be funded from the Government's Local Growth Fund. A total of over £64m of funding has been made available through various rounds of the Growth Fund to fund transport schemes in East Sussex. Funding has been awarded for the delivery of the following packages of local transport improvements which will support the housing and employment growth in the growth corridors around Eastbourne/South Wealden and Bexhill/ Hastings: Eastbourne and South Wealden walking and cycling package and

Hailsham, Polegate and Eastbourne Sustainable Transport Corridor. Locally, proposals for Alfriston traffic management £200,000, Polegate Cross Road Junction Improvements £400,000, Polegate high street 20MPH and footway improvements and Eastbourne Road Bus Lane design work £30,000 have been agreed.

Annual Report of Planning 2021 / 22: The Clerk gave a verbal report as follows: **Total applications received = 24, South Downs National Park = 14** - LMPC supported 12, objected to 1, 1 was withdrawn; SDNPA approved 8, refused 4, 1 was withdrawn, 1 prior approval not required. **Wealden District Council = 10** LMPC supported 6, objected to 3, 1 more information requested. WDC approved 6 and 3 are still outstanding, 1 was withdrawn.

Annual Reports of the Parish Associations

Wilmington, Milton Street and Folkington Village Club – Ruth Zacharewicz - Chairman

As Covid restrictions lifted in June 2021, we re-opened the Village Hall (after undertaking a Covid risk assessment of course! – thank you Melissa). First up: the Parish Council met in person - the first 'event' in the Hall since our last film night in early March 2020!

In July we held drinks in the garden – it was lovely to meet people again - and we were blessed with an abundance of fine food, particularly sausages, provided by many villagers.

The highlight for private hire of the Hall came in August with Mark and Jan's wedding.

In September – Annie restarted Film night and managed 4 sessions with a diverse selection of films from "The Joker" to "Military Wives". The new sound system definitely makes it more of a 'cinema experience'. But better (in the Hall you can sit and watch **with** your glass of wine to hand).

Annie was in overdrive in 2021 as she also organised 'Spanish Night' in October. Much food and wine consumed followed by dancing (Annie got a professional dancer to give us all a lesson in Flamenco after the meal). The event was sold out. Rumour has it that the 'hard core' left the Hall in the small hours.

For November we trialled a 'Games Night' organised by Hilary and Claire. Table Tennis, shuffleboard, skittles and cards were on offer. We'll be running more in future but maybe earlier so that it works for the younger children. Many thanks to Mark for the donation of the shuffleboard – which we also used to good effect for the pub night!

Our Christmas Fayre - luckily very early in December – was very well attended, lots of great stalls and tea and cakes. Everyone must have felt like spending because it certainly gave a boost to our finances for the year. Many thanks to Christine for pulling it all together.

Covid intervened again to halt Christmas parties and film showings. We restarted in the Hall with Reverend Shirley's Quiz Night at the end of January in aid of Tearfund. If you didn't manage to make it this time, look out for the next one in the tail end of the year (the questions were very fair which made it more enjoyable than some 'competitive' pub quiz nights).

January saw the 'Pub in the Club' being launched which we'll be running on the last Friday of the month until the Giants' Rest reopens. If you fancy the chance to run a 'pub' for an evening please come and talk to me!

A special mention for Abey for organising the 'tap to pay' gizmo which was used at quiz night, pub in the club and the history talk to great effect. Now you can pay for your drinks with a credit card or phone rather than having to use cash!

The final event before publication was a talk from Ian Gledhill about the origins of the British seaside as a recreational space – all credit to Alan for organising this one and for his ongoing help with the maintenance issues and rewriting our health and safety rules. Alan also organised replacement pads for our defibrillator which is now working again.

During 2020 and 2021, the Hall was empty for a long time. Just before lockdown we put in a new kitchen - a vast improvement on the old one. We have found out though that we need a real overhaul of the electrics – the new kitchen has finally pushed us to do a significant sort out and upgrade to meet current standards. This will take all our revenue for the next couple of years.

During lockdown we also lost – because they moved from the village - our previous Chairman, Tom, and our previous Treasurer, Peter. We owe both of them a great debt for running the Hall so well for so long. I am personally very thankful we still had Claire, our secretary, because without her knowhow and support it would have been very difficult to take over as Chair.

Richard stepped in to fill the Treasurer's shoes and ended up giving our bank account a $21^{\rm st}$ century makeover – so we can make electronic payments and accept them. This proved a lot harder than it should have been – all credit to Richard for his endless patience with Barclays and for Nigel's help in amending the deeds in order to finally get us there.

It's been a difficult time and I'd like to personally thank all those that have stepped up whether by running events, organising the bar, updating the website (thank you Debbie and Claire), managing bookings, cleaning up (thank you Kelly), managing maintenance contractors, generally helping out or providing food and drink for the events (thank you Billy, Tony and Belinda). And I am very pleased that we have such a dedicated committee and representation from Milton Street (Vicky) and Folkington (Katrina).

Given everything, I'm very pleased with how things have gone this past year and look forward to doing more in 2022. My overall approach is to enable the Hall to be used by as many of the residents of Wilmington, Folkington and Milton Street as possible and I'm open to all suggestions that help that happen.

Long Man Tree Warden - Alison Cotton

Over the last year it has been concerning to see ash trees within the parish increasingly affected by Ash Dieback disease, leading to the felling of whole areas of ash alongside footpaths on the Folkington estate. There was some consternation from the public regarding this apparently harsh treatment, prompting SDNPA rights of way department to adopt a more sensitive approach to the ash trees along 'Peaches' stretch of the South Downs Way. This resulted in the trees being individually surveyed, facilitated by the cutting of ivy. Interestingly, this also provoked an outcry, in opposition to the destruction of ivy. The subject of ivy is complex and emotive, as this proved. For many it signifies neglect and untidiness, but we know that ivy does not threaten the lives of trees, and provides food and nesting opportunities for birds, and late forage for pollinators. Corresponding with the Rights of Way officer, speaking with the ecologist who carried out the surveys, and also with the furious but well-informed ivy-lovers, afforded me a glimpse into the tricky world of balancing public access to the countryside with nature conservation.

This Winter we have once more taken part in SDNPA's tree planting project Trees for the Downs, researching which elm cultivars are resistant to Dutch Elm Disease, and provide habitat for wildlife, e.g. the White Letter Hairstreak butterfly which relies on elm trees. This is our third round of planting since February 2019. This February 19 recipients have received and planted 200 elms and 190 natives such as Sessile Oak and Hornbeam. The elms will be monitored over time, so all their locations have been logged and photographs by planters. I have recently collected and shared this data with SDNPA.

In January I submitted an expression of interest to SDNPA for their 'Call for Nature' initiative, to improve the Wilmington Junction with planting, and possibly to restore the pond. They offer specialist guidance to develop projects, and to act as a 'matchmaker' to connect projects with one or more appropriate funding opportunities available. I have been notified that our application is through to the next round, and that an officer will be in touch to begin discussions on progressing our project. I am keen to assemble a small steering group for this, to represent interested parish residents.

The audited Accounts and Annual Report were approved. Thanks was expressed to Mr James Stephens who had acted as LMPC Internal Auditor.

The Accounting Statements (Section 2): Section2 was approved.

The Exemption Certificate to be sent to the Auditors: The Exemption Certificate was approved.

Representatives on other bodies:

Wealden District Association of Local Councils: - Minutes for this are received via email at present and it was agreed that this would continue for the forthcoming year.

East Sussex Association of Local Councils (2 Councillors for November AGM): Minutes for this are received via email at present and it was agreed that this would continue for the forthcoming year.

Cuckmere Flood Forum: Minutes and correspondence for this are received via email and it was agreed that the Clerk would circulate out this information for the forthcoming year.

There being no other business the meeting was declared closed at 7.45pm.

LONG MAN PARISH COUNCIL MEETING-7.45PM

Councillor Merritt Chaired the meeting and welcomed everyone. Alison Cotton (Tree Warden) ave her apologies for this part of the meetings. There was no Public Discussion.

.Minutes of the meeting dated 14 March 2022 were approved and signed as a true record

The Minutes were agreed and signed as a correct record.

Matters arising from the Minutes of the meeting held on 14 March 2022

Milton Gate Travellers Site: Correspondence had been sent to Wealden District Council as requested.

Stile repairs in Milton Street: No response had been received from ESCC to date. The Clerk and Councillor Baulcombe to follow this up.

Report of the County Councillor – Councillor Stephen Shing: Councillor Shing had given his annual report at the Annual Assembly meeting held earlier this evening. He thanked Long Man Parish Council for its continued good working relationship with him. Nothing else was reported on this occasion.

Report of the District Councillor – Councillor Michael Lunn:

Waste Issue - Councillor Lunn gave an update on the current industrial action being taken with Biffa and will keep the Council informed of any developments. Weekly updates are being circulated by Wealden District Council and information is on their website. Recycling and garden

waste collections are being curtailed at the present time to concentrate on general waste collections. Councillors reported that waste bin collections had not taken place in the parish since the start of the industrial action. Councillor Lunn noted this and said he would report this back.

He also stated that waste bin collections will not be made if bins are overflowing. Councillor Lunn also encouraged Councillors to inform him of any other issues within the Parish.

Ukrainian Refugees - Councillor Lunn reported that Wealden District Council has taken a large proportion of refugees. Concerns had been expressed regarding the impact on the educational places being allocated in September. Councillor Lunn reported that it will have no impact on the places available. Wealden District Council are working with other support organisations regarding the various aspects of the refugee situation and stated that there will be challenges ahead.

Wealden Local Plan - Councillor Lunn reported that Wealden District Council are actively lobbying the Government regarding the new housing numbers they have set out. The District does not have the necessary infrastructure in place to cope with the numbers stated. The Local Plan cannot progress until this issue has been resolved. Councillor Lunn will keep the Parish Council informed of any progress.

South Downs National Park - Councillor Lunn continues to sit on the National Park Board and reported the following:

Rewilding Project: Concerns had been raised from landowners regarding this project.

De-shingling of the Seven Sisters area – Councillor Lunn expressed concern about the

non-committal of the relevant agencies of doing this as it could prove detrimental to flooding, tourism, etc.

Water Levels Management Board - Councillor Lunn reported that the Environment Agency and Wealden District Council are in communication with each other to discuss related issues within the area. He also reported that if de-shingling of the Seven Sisters area is required next year that funding is available.

Report from Maria Caulfield MP: Maria Caulfield MP had submitted a report which was read out at the meeting and covered the following: A27 meeting, Bin Strikes, Scrapping Tip charges to prevent fly-tipping, £4.1 million funding for better bus services in East Sussex, £150 Council Tax Rebate, New Family Hub in East Sussex, over one million half price rail tickets to benefit people in the Lewes Constituency. A copy of the full report is available from the Clerk.

Reports of the Parish Councillors

Folkington - Councillor Chisholm expressed concern regarding the new cycle path along the A27, pointing out that both cyclists and motorists need to take extra care and be prepared to stop where side roads join the A27 to avoid accidents.

Milton Street - Nothing to report.

Wilmington - Councillor Church reported back on the meeting she had attended regarding the dualling of the A27 from Berwick to Polegate. Fact finding is currently taking place with a view to a Public Consultation being held next year. More information to follow when available.

Councillor Church reported that the Village Club have organised a Big Lunch to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee. This will take place on Sunday 5 June at Wilmington Village Hall.

The Village Club have also successfully applied for funding to plant a mini copse in the Village Hall grounds which will be made up of Silver Birch, Dog Rose and Rowan trees. A memorial bench is also being made and a competition for the children of the parish to design a plaque for the bench which will be placed in the Village Hall grounds. A memorial tree planting for Peter Toynton will also take place.

Report of the Tree Warden – Alison Cotton: See report submitted for the Annual Assembly Meeting also held this evening.

A27 news : Minutes of the meeting held in April with Highways England, Maria Caulfield MP and

Wilmington residents had been circulated. Currently awaiting a response from Highways

England. The Clerk was asked to follow this up.

Report of the Clerk to the Council Finance -Finance Report and agree the accounts for payments.

The report was circulated at the meeting which revealed a bank balance of £16,171.81 in the Current Account (as at 06/05/2022). This figure included the £5,000 ring fenced for emergencies, £2,500 designated for grants and donations and the £250 for the Milton Street Phone Box Fund. source for spiders, so they are able to thrive.

Lovingly known as "Tarangela" amongst her colleagues, Angela knows almost all there is to know about arachnids. Having recently retired from full time employment at Drusillas after 22 years, she now concentrates on studying and identifying our native eight-legged friends and she even boasts a collection of over 100 spiders at home in her spare bedroom!

Ray commented: "It's spider season again and as the days get longer it seems everyone thinks that spiders get bigger. In reality they are no bigger than last year it's just that having not seen them during the winter months we all jump when we see one. Although for me it's a jump for joy! Why? Because spiders are our friends and do an amazing job at ridding us of those annoying flies that buzz around our heads and help to protect our much-needed crops against insects intent on munching it all."

Angela commented: "Even as a child I loved spiders. They have fascinated me for over thirty years. Something some people find strange is that I'm a woman. They are often surprised and ask if I go on expeditions to Borneo with my husband and do I look for spiders? The truth is that I lead the expeditions and I'm often the first one into a cave or a rainforest to find them. I have found a number of new species and cannot wait to get back out there"

Angela continued: "Here in the UK we have over 800 different types of spiders, none of which are dangerous to humans. On the contrary, spiders are actually extremely helpful and harmless creatures, but despite this fact, they instil fear in many and have a terrible reputation."

"What people don't always realise is that spiders are an integral part of the

ecosystem and are working to help us. These little wonders consume countless crop-destroying, disease-carrying insects annually, saving both livelihoods and lives."



"There is no good reason to be afraid of them. The vast majority of the world's spiders are harmless and extremely beneficial invertebrates. There are no dangerous spiders in the UK. Even the big spiders such as tarantulas don't want to hurt you. They are very docile and quite friendly if you give them a chance."

However millions of perfectly rational people have an irrational fear. But do spiders deserve such a wicked reputation? Drusillas want to change that reputation and as such, in partnership with Angela and Ray, have developed a four-hour course that aims to assist the arachnophobe to not only overcome their fears, but to

leave with a better understanding of these misunderstood creatures.

Throughout the day participants will learn all about spider biology and behaviour, be taught how to face their fears, and even handle some new spider friends. The day is managed under very calm, controlled conditions, and with experts on hand at all times.

Angela Hale continued: "We've held many spider phobia courses in the past and we see such wonderful results; everyone that attends leaves their phobia at the door and goes home feeling much more confident and less afraid. It can be hard for people, especially those who are terrified, but the more time you spend in a spider's company the more you realise there really isn't anything to be afraid of. It's just Hollywood that's made them scary!"

"If you do find an unwanted guest, please bear in mind the wonderful work they do. Take the time to remove it humanely by gently placing a glass over the spider, then carefully pushing a piece of paper underneath; you can then move it outside and let it go."


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
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
