FROM THE PARSONAGE

Two men turned up outside Berwick church late one Sunday afternoon at the end of a busy weekend in June. They had backpacks and were hot and tired. They were pilgrims walking from Southampton to Canterbury; one was Czech, the other Irish. They asked for water, food if possible and if there was somewhere they could sleep. They had only $\pounds 5$ and this was 'emergency money' that they were trying to save.

Having travelled in the mountains in Greece when I was young, the tradition of giving hospitality to strangers had made a big impression on me. The generosity towards us of poor people living in small villages even though they had never met us before has stayed with me. The two men got their food and overnight accommodation. And they helped take down a marquee and clear up after a church event.

A certain hesitancy and awkwardness in their initial request arose from the fact that they were two Jesuit novices who had been given the task of walking the route, depending on the help of others and faith in God as part of their formation. They never knew what kind of response they were going to get and they had had some negative experiences. Perhaps some were more fearful of letting them into their personal sphere as a result of Covid and nervous about getting involved with

two vulnerable people. As well as depending on the hospitality of others they also had to travel without phones.

It was interesting meeting these two people who had chosen such a path in life and were now finding it quite a tiring experience, not knowing what was coming each day and how people were going to respond. Their pilgrimage became a task in trusting God, as well as in the kindness of strangers.

The encounter reminded me just how much Covid can influence the way people respond to strangers and how easy it is to close your own personal world to others. I wonder how many people have become strangers through Covid as a result of lack of social contact, just how many strangers would really welcome the kindness of others. And it also made me think of the path of trust and faith in God, rather than plans and strategies, and just how uncomfortable and tiring it can be to live in that way. Also of how Jesus's first disciples must have experienced that difficult call of Jesus: 'come and follow me'. It is encouraging and challenging to meet people who are still responding to God's calling in the way those young men heard it.

Good News: Our Churches Remain Open For Private Prayer.

We are delighted that Government regulations now permit us to open our church buildings for services and individual prayer and hope that anyone wishing to do so will feel safe to enter.

All churches in the Benefice are open every day and opening patterns are the same as they were previously in each parish.

The term individual is defined as follows: "A person or household entering the venue to pray on their own and not part of a group led prayer or communal act." (Robert Jenrick announcement)

If you do wish to use the church for private prayer, please be mindful of the importance of following government advice in respect of hand washing and social distancing.

Notices have been put up on church noticeboards, on the church doors and at the entry and exit points for each church, to provide specific guidance about the safety and hygiene arrangements in each church, as details may differ slightly due to the differences in the church buildings. For example: in some churches pews may be roped off to limit the amount of routine cleaning required and in some churches there is access to running water. Please read these notices carefully before entering the church.

- Hand sanitiser has been placed in the porch area of each church and also inside the church near the door.
- Please use this before entering and when exiting the church. NB. it is still
 wise to wash and dry your hands thoroughly with soap and water a soon as
 you get home, as an extra precaution.
- Please observe the social distancing rules and maintain a distance of 2 metres between yourself and others not in your household whilst in the church. Individual churches may have additional guidance about this so please observe any specific measures which have been put in place in individual churches.
- If the church appears too crowded to facilitate social distancing, please wait outside until it is safe to enter.

Please do not enter the church if you or anyone in your household has symptoms of Covid 19 or if you have been advised to self - isolate because you have been in contact with someone who has tested positive.

Cleaning schedules have been revised to ensure door handles, light switches and other areas likely to have been touched by others are cleaned daily when the church is opened but please be mindful of the fact that surfaces might have been contaminated later in the day and avoid touching surfaces unnecessarily.

WILMINGTON NEWS

The Wilmington Yew

Here is a very interesting report on the yew tree. This was commissioned by the Woodland Trust after our nomination for the Tree of the Year award.

Paul Melarange of Thinktrees Ltd. has been instructed by Rob Daulby of The Woodland Trust to inspect three trees that were nominated in the English Tree of the Year Competition 2020. The Wilmington Yew, an ancient yew tree growing in the churchyard of the Church of St.Mary & St.Peter, is one of the nominated trees.

A site visit was carried out on 17th January 2021. A visual assessment of the tree was carried out from ground level. During my visit I took photographs to illustrate specific points in this report. A pictorial overview is included on the next page, which indicates the locations of the key features and characteristics that are discussed in the appraisal (section 4).



The Wilmington Yew, which is believed to be approximately 1600 years old, comprises two separate stems. Both of which have been

supported by wooden props for many years. These were augmented with seven new props in 2019.

There is a steel chain which connects both stems. It is positioned at approximately 5m on the northern stem and at approximately 4m on the southern stem. It is likely that the amount that the southern stem leans has increased since the chain was installed. It would appear that the southern stem is now essentially hanging from the northern stem, rather than the two stems counter-balancing each other. The load that the weight of the southern stem is applying to the northern stem may be causing it to twist and split. If the splits increase in size, or additional splits occur, it may be necessary to remove the chain. If this intervention were to be required, it would be prudent to consult an engineer to advise on the suitability of the props to carry the loads produced by the stems without the additional support of the chain.

The tree demonstrates normal vitality for a tree in the 'ancient' age class, indicating that it is in good physiological condition.

Some of the lowest branches are touching the ground, albeit very lightly. There is unlikely to be enough contact between the branches and the ground, at present, to enable layering to occur. Layering is a natural process whereby low branches can develop new roots systems if they are in continuous physical contact with the ground. This process has the potential to add to the stability of the tree and also perpetuate its survival. Consideration should be given to encouraging the low branches to layer. This may be achieved by pegging them down to restrict their movement.

The tree's age and the associated veteran features mean that the Wilmington Yew is of national, and potentially international, importance in terms of its significant cultural, historical, biological and arboricultural value. Consequently, it is frequently visited by the public. The tree overhangs the footpath to the church, which forms part of the Cuckmere Pilgrim Path, and is in close proximity to church itself. It is, therefore, advised that it is re-inspected every two and a half years, by a suitably qualified, experienced and insured arboriculturist.

The approved minutes are posted on the notice boards and on the website (www.longmanpc.org) shortly after the meeting in which they are approved.

NOTES ON THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING AND THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING Held via Zoom on Wednesday 5th May 2021 at 7.30pm

Those present were: Councillors Pam Merritt, Jeremy Christey, Tyler Butterworth, Lizzie Chisholm Claire Reynolds (Clerk). No parishioners attended. Apologies had been received from Councillors Michael Bridges, Helen Baulcombe, Claire Church and Alison Cotton (Tree Warden), With regard to the Register of Members' Interests there were no changes to the current information supplied. There was no Declaration Of Interest.

ANNUAL MEETING - 7.30PM

Elect a Chairman and receive the Chairman's Declaration of Acceptance of Office - Councillor Pam Merritt was elected as Chairman for the coming year. Elect a Vice Chairman and receive the Vice Chairman's Declaration of Acceptance of Office - Tyler Butterworth was elected as Vice-Chairman for the coming year.

The Minutes of the last Annual Parish Meeting held on Monday 13 May 2019 were approved and singed as a true record. (Due to the Covid Pandemic an Annual Meeting of the Parish Council was not held in 2020 and therefore the last Annual Parish Council Meeting was held in 2019.

Annual Accounts and Annual Governance Statement (Section 1): The audited Accounts were circulated to the Councillors and copies were made available at the meeting – These were approved. Approval of the audited Accounts and Annual Report was proposed by Councillor Pam Merritt and seconded by Councillor Tyler Butterworth and unanimously agreed. Wealden District Association of Local Councils - Minutes for this are received via email at present and it was agreed that this would continue for the forthcoming year.

East Sussex Association of Local Councils (2 Councillors for November AGM) - Minutes for this are received via email at present and it was agreed that this would continue for the forthcoming year.

Cuckmere Flood Forum - Minutes and correspondence for this are received via email and it was agreed that the Clerk would circulate out this information for the forthcoming year.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - 7.45PM

Councillor Merritt Chaired the meeting and welcomed everyone.

Public Discussion (15 minutes maximum). There was no Public Discussion.

The Minutes of the meeting dated 8 March 2021 were approved and signed as a true record.

Matters arising from the Minutes of the meeting held on 8 March 2021 - A response from Wealden District Council had been received saying that they were looking into the query regarding building works at the traveller site in Milton Street.

Report of the County Councillor – Councillor Stephen Shing - Councillor Stephen Shing reported that Polling Day was tomorrow for the Local Elections. He has enjoyed working with Long Man Parish Council and, if re-elected, is looking forward to working with us in the future.

Councillor Jeremy Christey raised a query regarding fibre-broadband. Could it be installed and rolled out along the cycle way to Firle?

Various information regarding the Wilmington junction work have been received by Councillors. If reelected Councillor Shing will look into both these things and report back. If not, it will be passed onto the newly elected Councillor.

Report of the District Councillor – Councillor Michael Lunn - Councillor Lunn was not present therefore no report was received.

Reports of the Parish Councillors

Folkington - Folkington to Jevington bridlepath – ongoing problems with this. Councillor Chisholm to locate grid reference via the Ordnance Survey website and report the issues.

Milton Street - Councillor Butterworth highlighted the Planning Application that had been received for a polo pitch to be built at Milton Gate. Concerns had been raised and members of the public would be encouraged to express these concerns directly to Wealden District Council Planning Department.

Wilmington - There have been issues regarding loose dogs up on the Downs resulting in one dog losing its life having been chased onto the road. The Dog Warden to be informed.

Councillor Merritt to write and thank ESCC Rights of Way team for replacing the gate by the Long Man.

Report of the Tree Warden - Alison Cotton

SDNPA – Removal of ivy from trees in Milton Street - Alison reported that she had been liaising with the resident and SDNPA regarding this matter and had been reassured that the work carried out had been necessary but realised there was sometimes a difficult balancing act between ensuring the safety of the public and respecting the flora and fauna within the SDNP.

Platinum Jubilee Tree planting – 2022 - Alison reported that Arlington Community Club are looking into planting small copses and asked if Long Man Parish Council might like to do the same.

Free tree giveaway - Alison is looking into this and will report back at the next meeting. **Ades Field trees issue** – Alison had been liaising with the resident, landowner and WDC Tree

Warden regarding the tall trees in the field at the bottom of some of the gardens in Ades Field. A letter will be sent to the landowner.

Save the Oaks Scheme – Alison reported that she had been given 10 oak trees under this scheme and they had been planted up last week.

Dutch Elm Disease Resistant Scheme - Alison to carry this forward.

Planting query from resident – Alison had assisted a resident on what and where to plant things in their garden following a request via Councillor Christey.

The Councillors thanked Alison for all her hard work over the past year with regards to tree issues and queries.

Corona Virus - Regular updates are being received from the Wealden Community Hub and there are links on the LMPC website.

A27 news - Regular updates on the A27 junction improvements are being received and circulated out to Councillors and put on the LMPC website.



Head Keeper, Sophie Leadbitter, commented: "Animals do not perspire in the same way as humans do, so we use the ice blocks to keep them comfortable in the heat. Ultimately, the animals are after the rewards hidden within, but as they grab at and break down the ice lollies to get the food, their mouths and paws are cooled."

"Ice lollies are a great way to keep the animals cool, but they also serve an enrichment purpose as well. Making the animals work for their food in creative ways, helps to stimulate them mentally and physically and forces them to use their instincts to look for food as they would in the wild."



The squirrel monkeys and meerkats were also treated to veggie ice pops to help them cool down, which the greedy groups devoured within minutes. Elsewhere in the zoo animals such as the flamingos have been combatting the heat by walking around their waterfall, the capybaras and beavers have been taking long dips in their pool and the red pandas have been napping the day away in the shade of their trees. Whilst children have been flocking to the splash pad at the Park to play in the fountains to keep cool!






