FROM THE VICARAGE

There is a legend of a king who decided to honour his greatest subject. A large gathering was held in the palace and four finalists were brought forward. The first person presented was a wealthy philanthropist. This man was deserving of the honour because of his humanitarian efforts; he had given much of his wealth to the poor. The second was a celebrated physician, deserving of the honour because he had rendered faithful and dedicated service to the sick for many years. The third person was a distinguished judge, deemed worthy as he was noted for his wisdom, his fairness, and his brilliant decisions.

The fourth person presented was an elderly woman. The quiet little lady hardly looked the part of someone who would be honoured as the greatest subject in the kingdom. People were puzzled: who was she? What chance could she possibly have, when compared to the others who had accomplished so much?

The king was intrigued; he walked over to her and asked who she was. She smiled and answered: "You see the philanthropist, the doctor, and the judge? I was their teacher!" The king nodded and turned away. He gave the award to the judge. We need people of integrity, of courage, and ability, especially at times of upheaval, uncertainty and division. In society with strikes and financial stresses, and further

afield, places of earthquakes, hunger and war. At present, only one person stands out as award-winning: Ukraine President Zelensky, and yet there are so many who are giving so much, even risking their lives to help others.

The Church too, has times of crisis, as now. This week Synod adopted proposals from the bishops to offer blessings in church for people in same sex marriages. No decision ever satisfies everybody; what is seen as a triumph for some will be viewed as weakness, surrender, even betrayal by others. But, as Richard Coles wrote, (Sunday Times, 12.2.23) 'I suspect most people without a dog in the fight think it a sensible move.'

From his body language seen on TV, Archbishop Welby knows that this decision may well cause an irretrievable split in the worldwide Anglican Communion. This will affect thousands of Christians in their worship, and in their walk with God. Jesus prayed for his followers, that 'they may be one, just as we are one'. How can we seek unity in such times? I will draw an analogy, an anecdote, which I would like to share with you.

Leonardo da Vinci had started working on a large painting in his studio. He worked on the picture for a while, outlining its composition, colours, detailing etc. One day, he stopped working on the painting and asked one of his students to complete the work. The anxious student protested that he was both unworthy and unable to complete the great painting which Leonardo, his master, had begun. Da Vinci summoned him and silenced him: 'Will not what I have done inspire you to do your best?'

So to the nurses, the shop assistants, the bin collectors, the bankers, the farmers, the politicians, the teachers and the baristas making morning coffee to get people going, thank you, and God bless you.

Thomas Paine (1737-1809) was one of the most influential political activists and writers in history and The *Rights of Man*, published in 1791, one of the most widely read books of its time. His radical ideas about freedom, democracy, social justice and the importance of *Common Sense* remain a touchstone for modern provocateurs.

Paine no doubt debated and explored his left-field ideas in local taverns and coffeehouses - conspiratorial places where you could meet for conversation,

commerce, learn the news of the day and discuss matters of mutual concern. Hopefully, Long Man Inn will become a 21st-century equivalent - a hotbed of social intercourse fermenting stimulating and wild discussions, while serving great coffee and refreshing beverages. A sort of oasis for the exhilarated thirsty!

People often get rattled by other people's views, as I'm sure they did back in Paine's day, perhaps even resorting to the odd punch but nobody would be trolled, globally shamed, muted or cancelled - now common place online. Debate is the hard-won prize of democracy but with freedom of speech comes disagreement and dissent and thank God, people don't always agree! A pint of Long Man for my argumentative friend please!

How do we disagree agreeably?

Firstly, you can't always right so be open to other people's views and be willing to change your mind. An alternative viewpoint might not be what you believe but that doesn't mean you're right and they're wrong.

Secondly, *listen* to what is being said. Listening doesn't mean waiting for the other person to draw breath so you can jump in, it means hearing and being genuinely receptive to the other person's views and ideas. Have an open conversation not a closed one.

Thirdly, avoid slurs such as 'you're a moron' or 'shut the f^{***} up' because that's an emotionally-fuelled reaction, it demeans the debate, and is just downright rude and aggressive.



Lastly, be curious about why other people feel the way they do. It's often interesting and you find out about people. Even if what the person across the table is saying seems completely at odds with everything you believe, try to empathise with their view.

And finally, buy them a drink!

Below are the notes taken from the Unadopted Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting. The Unadopted Minutes are circulated to the Parish Councillors and subsequently considered at the next Parish Council Meeting and if agreed, are signed as a true record. The Minutes can only be publicised after they have been approved, therefore in order for there to be no undue delay in keeping the residents of the parish informed about the meetings, the notes are printed in the Parish Magazine. The approved minutes are posted on the notice boards shortly after the meeting in which they are approved.

NOTES OF THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING Held on Monday 9 January 2023 at 7.30pm at Wilmington Village Hall

Those present: Councillors Pam Merritt (Chair), Claire Church, Tyler Butterworth, Michael Bridges, Jeremy Christey, Helen Baulcombe, District Councillor Michael Lunn and County Councillor Stephen Shing. Claire Reynolds (Clerk). 1 member of the public was present. Councillor Merritt Chaired the meeting and welcomed everyone. Apologies had been received from Councillors Lizzie Chisholm and Alison Cotton (Tree Warden). There was no Declaration of Interest.

The Wilmington Bus shelter was discussed under the **Public Discussion**. A request was made to put a bench in the shelter and to move the rubbish bin so it was outside of the shelter. Councillor Bridges volunteered to take this forward. A query was also raised regarding reclaiming the VAT for the new bus shelter. The Clerk will look into this.

The Minutes of the meeting dated 14 November 2022 were signed as a true record.

With regard to the Matters arising from the Minutes of the meeting held on 14 November 2022 - Milton Street: It was noted that The tree branch has now been removed.

Report of the County Councillor – Councillor Stephen Shing

- a. ESCC Highways: Councillor Shing reported that there will be a new ESCC Highways Contractor appointed from April 2023 – April 2030. It will then be reviewed again.
- b. ESCC Local Plan: The Public Consultation had taken place. Comments received will be integrated into the Local Plan. There will be three meetings taking place with a final decision being made in November 2023.
- c. Exceat Bridge: The planning application for this had been approved in December 2022 subject to conditions. Tenders will be put in place for contractors to be appointed.
- d. Milton Street signage: Councillor Shing had been liaising with Councillors Butterworth and Baulcombe with regards to new signage for Milton Street and thanked them for their assistance.
- e. Council Tax: There will be an increase in the Council Tax for the 2023 / 2024 year.

Report of the District Councillor – Councillor Michael Lunn

a. Wealden Local Plan

Wealden District Council and others have been lobbying the Secretary of State regarding the housing target formula regarding the south-east area protected sites. The Government have made a U-turn which means that the housing numbers will now be decided based on the local need and not the original formula. Once the Local Plan is published and approved this will then put the brake on future developments. It is good news in the long term.

b. Cuckmere

The shingle at the mouth of the Cuckmere estuary had been cleared recently. There is a ring fenced amount of money to carry out similar work as required. Flooding is still occurring but is disappearing quicker. Farmers have reported that the Cuckmere Valley sluices are not working and Councillor Lunn is meeting with the Water Levels Management Board next week to discuss this. The dialogue between all parties concerned with this appears to be working well now.

c. South Downs National Park Visitor Centre at Exceat

This is now open to all. The site includes SDNPA offices, café, car parks, etc and is being well utilised. An improved grazing regime for wildflowers is also underway.

Reports of the Parish Councillors

Folkington - Councillor Chisholm will be standing down in the not too distant future. **Milton Street -** The offending branch as per the last Minutes has now been removed. Approval for the new Milton Street signs is due in March 2023.

Wilmington

- i. Village Hall Lift: Councillor Church reported that the majority of funding had now been secured to install a new lift at the Village Hall.
- ii. Wilmington Junction Planting Scheme: Councillor Church reported that the deadline for comments regarding this is the 15 January 2023.
- iii. Councillors have received queries regarding issues about building works taking place. After discussion it was advised that the owners of the properties be approached in the first instance. It can then be reported to South Downs Planning Authority if necessary.
- iv. Councillor Vacancy: Councillor Merritt will be standing down at the next election. It was agreed to put a notice in the Parish Magazine to try and recruit new Councillor.

Report of the Tree Warden - Alison Cotton -

a. Currently collecting feedback to the Wilmington Junction planting plan.

b. Concerns had been raised at the large volume of tree felling at a property in Milton Street and

this will be followed up.

A27 news

- a. Roadworks: Resurfacing of the A27 is taking place from the 9 14 January 2023 overnight.
- b. Traffic Lights: The problem with the traffic lights had been reported to Highways.
- c. RIS3 Project: This is ongoing.

Council Elections – 4 May 2023

Councillor Merritt explained the following regarding the Council Elections: Forms for Councillors standing for election need to be submitted to Wealden District Council by 4.00pm on the 4th April 2023. An appointment will need to be made by prospective Councillors with WDC Electoral Services Department so that their applications can be gone through prior to the deadline.

All Councillors will need to submit their applications even if there is not an Election. Nomination packs will be sent to the Clerk to distribute.

Councillors require to be over 18 years of age, qualified as citizens and lived in or within 3 miles of the Parish for the last year.

If insufficient nominations are received but the Council is still quorate Councillors can then be co-opted throughout the year.

Councillors will take office on the 9 May 2023.

The LMPC Meeting will therefore take place on the 15 May due to the Election timetable. Declaration of Interest and Acceptance of Office Forms and Expenses Form need to be submitted (by 2 June 2023). If expenses are nil forms still need to be submitted otherwise Councillors will not be able to sit on the Parish Council or vote.

Long Man Parish Clerk Vacancy

Councillor Merritt reported that 4 applications had been received for the position of Parish Clerk/RFO. Interviews will take place this coming Wednesday and Friday.

Although her last day was the 4 January 2023, the current Clerk was willing to work up until the

end of January 2023 whilst the recruitment process takes place and handover to the new Clerk.

Councillor Merritt therefore proposed that LMPC pay the Clerk up until the 31st January 2023.

This was seconded by Councillor Butterworth and all Councillors present agreed.

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

Mid WINTER NEWS From Saint Peter's Church, Folkington

This edition of news has both good and sad stories to tell from our village and church. On the day after Christmas, we were deeply sad to hear that The Reverend Canon David Gutsell had died on Christmas Eve aged 87. David came to take services at St Peter's over many years, especially on Sea Sunday in July and on Advent Sunday. As long ago as 2013 he devised and arranged this special Service for the First Sunday in Advent that has become one of our best loved celebrations. He wove together seven

readings from Isaiah with Advent hymns and the 'a cappella' anthems sung by Sylvia's Singers. In 2019 David took his last Advent with us, on the brink of his retirement. He brought us musical skill on the organ, gentle wisdom and guidance. A Service of Thanksgiving for him was held on February 2nd at All Saints, Patcham. A fine tribute was given by Reader Alan Packard. David and Alan were good friends for many years since their time together in Polegate, when David was the Rector and Alan a warden. In 2021 Alan took the Advent Sunday service, giving thanks to David for his inspiration.

We were also so sorry to hear of the death just before Christmas of longtime Folkington resident Mick Barnett at the age of 80. He suffered a heart attack on Christmas Eve and despite valiant efforts by paramedics and by the Critical Care Unit in the Eastbourne Hospital Mick passed away. A Funeral and Memorial Service for him was held at Wealden Crematorium near Horam, where family and friends gathered to pay respects and to remember him with love. The service included tributes, poems and lovely music. Mick lived in Folkington village from 1969, working on the Folkington Estate farms first for the Burgess family, and then for the Ellis family. After 37 hardworking years he retired, and devoted his time to tending his chickens, the garden, seeing grandchildren and craft work. On the Sunday after his funeral a tribute to Mick was given in Folkington church by The Reverend Damien Brennan.

January church Services included Holy Communion on New Year's Day led by The Reverend Stephen, with a remarkably large number of people considering the revelries of the night before! This was followed by Epiphany with The Reverend Neville Manning and Epiphany 2 with The Reverend Damien. On January 22nd our old friend of many years, The Reverend Colin Pritchard from Seaford, took a service where he talked about the Old Testament.

Bishop Martin Warner of the Diocese of Chichester has asked for 2023 to be the 'Year of the Old Testament'. Colin gave a fascinating talk on the contents of the O.T. describing the vulnerable geography of the ancient lands of the Hebrew peoples invaded by powerful neighbouring empires. He mentioned the Hebrew tribes and their history. He also reminded us of the lay- out of the Old Testament, ranging from Genesis through the turbulent histories in Exodus and Kings, with above all the familiar and stirring passages of Isaiah and the Minor Prophets. As an example of how ancient texts can be relevant to our generations, he guoted the prophetic words of Isaiah used in Handel 's Messiah which resonate to - day.



At the end of January a United Benefice Service for all at Alfriston marked Candlemas, and our Nativity Manger with its Three Kings. disappeared until next Advent.
