

Poem by Antony Mair: Rev. and Mrs. Boys Ellman, 1860

They sit in their usual chairs, The hearth between them. A log settles: a flurry of sparks. Their spaniel stretches out on his side, asleep. By the oil-lamp's light she stitches a torn shirt. her needle deft. Her husband is lost in a book about the early church. Drawn curtains shut them in Outside, the trees he planted raise tall shadows. In the darkness a rustle of hedgehogs in the fallen leaves. Today she taught the parish children while he visited the sick. No need now to talk: their thoughts are in harmony like notes in a familiar chord

Revd. Boys Ellman was Curate and then Rector of Berwick from 1840 to 1906 and is buried in the churchyard. He wrote the fascinating "Recollections of a Sussex Parson" which is also available in the church, and gives insights into life in Sussex in the nineteenth century, as well as the history of the parish at that time.

Antony Mair was the second poet in residence for the Cuckmere Pilgrim Path from 2023-2024, and he has published a small volume of poems

The access was good, the activities excellent, everyone was lovely". June's Gardener's Diary

This month is the last chance to sow main crop Carrots for them to be ready for harvesting in September or October. Also, Peas sown early in the month should still be ready in September.

Sow Swedes if they've not already been done and French Beans can go in for a second crop. Continue to sow Beetroot, Spring Onions, Turnips, Lettuces, and Radishes with some at the beginning of the month and some near the end.

This is also the last chance to sow Runner Beans and with a bit of luck will give you a crop as late as October.

Watering is especially important in dry weather. Keep the roots of all

plant moist but not soaking wet. Hopefully, this month we will be harvesting some of the early sowings – i.e. Potatoes, Radishes, Turnips, Carrots, Peas and a few more.

Recipe of the Month: Lemon and Lime Cheesecake

(Serves 8)

Ingredients 100 g digestive biscuits

50 g butter

1 tbsp caster sugar

Filling

250 g mascarpone

375 g full-fat condensed milk

Juice of a small lemon

3 tbsps. lemon curd

Finely grated zest and juice of two limes

Method

Line a 20 cm shallow spring-form tin with cling film.

Crush the biscuits with a rolling pin until they are fine crumbs. Melt the butter in a pan, add crumbs and sugar, and stir until combined. Press the biscuit crumbs into the base of the tin and place it in the fridge while making the filling.

Measure the mascarpone and condensed milk into a bowl and whisk until smooth. Add the lemon juice and curd and nearly all the lime zest (reserving some for garnish) and juice and whisk again until thick and creamy. Spoon on top of the biscuit base, level the top, cover with cling film and chill for a minimum of two hours. Decorate with the reserved lime zest.

Sward Wardens: The Incredible Role of Dung Beetles

There's a subject we're not great at talking about in the UK: poo. However, there's a group of creatures that are far more celebratory of the topic, with their diet testament to their appreciation. Aptly named, dung beetles eat poo. And they are amazing.

You are likely to conjure the image of Heliocopris, giant dung beetle species which reside in Africa and Asia, manoeuvring huge droppings kindly deposited by some of the Earth's spectacular megafauna. Although these beetles don't match the size of the one that rolled a football into the 2010 World Cup opening ceremony, they are hefty for a beetle, reaching lengths of up to 7cm.

Our dung beetles are more diminutive, but no less vital. The UK is home to around 60 species, which are split into three groups: Aphodiines, or the 'dwellers', sized 3-13 mm who live directly in dung, Onthophagus, at 4-11 mm; 'tunnellers' who tunnel up to a metre below the dung, pulling down

small amounts to lay their eggs in, and the largest 'tunnellers' at 8-26 mm, the Geotrupes.



Mostly, they consume dung of herbivores and omnivores. The ultimate recyclers, dung beetles are ecosystem engineers, meaning they modify their environment to provide services to other species with whom they share the ecosystem. In the case of dung beetles, this is a poop removal service.

Not only do they improve grazing pasture by clearing grasslands of waste, but they also recycle vital nutrients, keeping soil healthy. Tunnelling aerates the soil and prevents compaction, which in turn mitigates against flooding. Whilst this waste processing keeps down the population of flies, the beetles also remove parasites living in the dung. The beetles are, in turn, prey to others, such as birds, bats and hedgehogs. It's all rather harmonious and, as nature does best, it's a perfectly 'symbiotic' relationship.

Yet, like most of our native wildlife. dung beetles are in trouble. Largely this is due to modifications in agricultural practices; changes in land-use and an increase of pesticides, whether this be directly onto fields or via livestock ingested worming medicines. These chemicals disrupt the brilliantly balanced natural process. especially when used large scale and preventatively. Landowners can support dung beetle populations by reducing pesticides; more dung beetles mean fewer parasites, so by protecting these species a free service is being retained.

We owe a lot to our dung beetles and must protect them. They're a critical part of our ecosystem, yet many of us don't know they exist here or appreciate their unglamorous and thankless work. To be frank, without them we would be up to our knees in poo. Metaphorically (and literally).

From the Parsonage

It has been said that we were each made with a built-in 'search engine'. It's one that works in a unique way to those available on our computer screens which find, with unbelievable speed, information that has been posted on 'the web', and by which we can inform and educate ourselves.

Our built-in search engine is more abstract, more fluid; a search for meaning, for truth, for what is not known, for what operates in a different dimension to our reason - a search for satisfaction. for peace, for happiness, for love, for healing, for forgiveness. So much seems to be within human, rational understanding and we anticipate that Artificial Intelligence (AI) will accelerate scientific progress. We begin to think that all that remains outside of our rational understanding will one day fall within it and, at that point, 'everything will come right'. But as society moves in that direction some people are beginning to feel alienated and dissatisfied. They are losing themselves and want a depth, a density of experience that speaks not just to their understanding. Something that is deeper and broader, that re-establishes their connections with the world and with others through a sense of belonging and the mystery of life.

At Jesus' trial Pilate, the Roman Governor, famously asks Jesus 'What is truth?'. The Bible doesn't relate what he meant. It leaves open the reality of ambiguity. On one level Pilate has like all people this inner search engine which seeks 'truth' - on another, sitting on a seat of power, he dismisses the relevance and the point of 'truth' when really all the world understands is power. This is a poignant moment, an opportunity; only Pilate can answer his own question by drawing on what is within him - if he can find it.

The intellects behind the development of AI have warned of its potentially negative impact on humanity. Faith and spirituality are concerned with our inner capacity to connect with something beyond ourselves - with 'Truth'. Within the Christian tradition this is also called 'Love'. It teaches that this is why we all have this 'inner search engine'. Faith encourages us to nurture this inner engine which searches for 'Truth', teaches that the freedom to do this spiritually, creatively, and intellectually is what matter most. Jesus instructed his followers to 'seek ye first the Kingdom of Heaven...' and not to stop doing that. It is only in our continual searching that we remain open to a Truth that provides what we are really looking for. But many things try to substitute for it and divert us from it.
